Protest rally against triba

KHAMMAM, Nov. 10. A serious conflict is brewing between the tribals and non-tribals in the sub plan area of Khammam district. The sole issue that has created the divide is the scheduled area regulation that has put a blanket ban on the transfer of land in favour of non-tribals. The emergence of the non-tribal organisations with a strong demand for amending Regulation 1 of 1970 has made the tribal pockets increasingly restive.

The revenue divisions of Bhadrachalam and Palvancha have witnessed a series of rallies, public meetings and protest demonstrations by non-tribal sections opposing the implementation of the regulation. Backed by major political parties, barring the CPI(M), they have been trying out all methods to mount pressure on the Government to change the regulation which is "unjust" to the non-tribals living in the tribal pockets.

A huge rally was organised in Manuguru on Thursday last by the Aikya Karyacharana Raithu Committee to highlight the problems being confronted by the non-tribal population. particularly the peasant community in the scheduled area. Thousands of people joined the rally coming all the way from Aswapuram and Pinapaka mandals. Speakers, who included Mr. Puvvada Nageswara Rao, MLA, and Mr. Balasani Lakshminarayana, Khammam DCCB chairman, appealed to the Government to make a thorough study of the situation prevailing in the tribal area and take corrective measures.

Aikaya Karyacharana Raithu Committee leaders stated that the non-tribal population was sinking into poverty as their properties had no takers. They had become aliens in their own land. The poorer sections among the non-tribals were also deprived of benefits they were entitled for under the land-based programmes sponsored by the Government because of the regulation. The land purchase scheme of the SC Corporation could not be implemented in the agencies for the same reason. So was the case with the housing programme.

Some of the tribal leaders and elected r sentatives also have been supporting the c of the scheduled area non-tribals thus g credence to the demand for amendment o regulation. The CPI MLA. Mr. Baddu Chou who took part in the Manuguru rally, also derlined the need for the amendment in orde restore harmony among the tribals and r tribals. So was the case with almost all the M and MPs of the CPI. Mr. Kunja Biksham is, h ever, the lone M.L.A from the party demand no change in the regulation.

The movement against regulation 1 of 19 took off in the district in September last with t Andhra Pradesh Scheduled Area Raithu Sar ham, another non-tribal organisation, holding massive rally in Bhadrachalam. It was follow by similar demonstrations in Julurupadu villa; and a few other places in October last. The no tribal organisations have been opposing the pr sumptive clause that the land in the schedule area belonged originally to the tribals. The exis ence of the non-tribal population in the schee uled areas was very much established b Captain Glasfourd, the then Assistant Commisioner of Settlement, in his survey report sul mitted to the British Government in 1862.

Some of the non-tribals have settled in th agencies at the invitation of the Government a well as the local zamindars well before Inde pendence. The Gannavarm colony in the sub plan area of Khammam district was one sucsettlement, they said. Political parties seekin the amendment have been highly critical of th stand taken by the CPI(M) on the issue. The pointed out that the Scheduled Tribes Restric tion on transfer of lands and Restoration of Alienated Lands Amendment Bill, 1996 wa passed unanimously by the Left Democratic Front Government in Kerala brushing aside the opposition of the tribals. The condition of the non-tribals in the scheduled areas in the State was in no way different for the CPI(M) to adopt a different line, the said.

The CPI(M), which has been strongly opposing the demand for amendment of the regulation, has taken up a countercampaign in
